Name of activity	What would you do if...
Description of activity	<p>Propose to the group (dividing it if large into two or more subgroups) a reflection starting from the question "What would you do if a stranger (online) asked you to take off your clothes or send nude or sexy photos of yourself?", listening and writing down the answers that emerge.</p> <p>In the first phase, each subgroup writes down their thoughts and discusses them together.</p> <p>The thoughts of all subgroups are then read out, presented and discussed in plenary and written down on a poster that can then be hung in the classroom.</p> <p>It is important to insist on age limits for the use of social networks by minors.</p> <p>As an initial stimulus or as a further reference in the plenary discussion, the possible answers below can be used and the group can be asked about the possible implications of each one, if they have other answers to add, or if there are better or worse ones:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- I keep my clothes on and close the chat.- I call my parents or an adult.- I close the chat and block this person.- I tell him/her to start undressing.- I let him/her see a part of my naked body. <p>Source: https://www.wlamore.it/giochi-da-ragazzi/</p>
Who are the participants?	This material is meant for youth workers in their work with young people (12 - 18 years old) using non-formal education methodologies.
Identification of the aims of the activity	To stimulate the group to reflect on the implications of the use of social networking and to educate them in a conscious and safe use of the internet.
Number of participants	10 or more participants
Duration	20–40 min
Materials for the activity	Sheets of paper and pens. Poster
Suggestions for the post-activation debriefing	Use the following questions to deepen the discussion: <ul style="list-style-type: none">- If something like this happened to you, would you talk to someone about it? With whom? What might prevent you from doing so?
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
